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1936 First Hospital is Formed

The first Trinity Hospital was the home of Dr. Mark B. Listerud's grandfather. Before that, the only facilities were three private homes used for maternity care. In 1936, the first Hospital Association was formed. The first tangible change was the purchase of the old hospital and equipment from Margaret Beddor in 1940. Then an airport building from Glasgow, Montana was purchased from the Government. Unfortunately, after the building was moved to Wolf Point, it was flattened by strong winds. Paul Johnson rebuilt it as good as new. The other wings were eventually moved in from Fort Peck. The completion of the 30 room, \$1,000,000 unit was dedicated on October 16, 1948. Which included \$35,000 in equipment to open its doors to patients.

1961 Trinity Hospital Doors Are Open

The Hospital Association started building the (Wolf Point) hospital we are now using. It is brick construction and consists of 25 rooms and was a 39-bed unit. January 29, 1961, was the day that more than 2,000 people came to look at the new Trinity Hospital Building (located at 315 Knapp St., in Wolf Point, Montana). This building replaced the temporary hospital used since 1948. That Tuesday night at 9 p.m., the hospital was initiated as a six-pound boy was born to Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Sandau of Poplar. Officials said hospital costs were paid by the hospital. Two surgeries were performed in the new operating rooms that Wednesday.

1962 Faith Home Dedication

On October 14, 1962, the formal dedication of the Faith Lutheran Home began and lasted a full week. More than 2,000 people were in attendance. Completion of the Faith Lutheran Home took nearly 6 years.

1964 Trinity Hospital Pediatric Wing Built

In 1964 or 1965, a Pediatric wing was built with 5 new rooms. But the "baby boom" was over and most patients preferred outpatient servicing. The wing was too expensive to maintain. Trinity Hospital refused to consider sacrificing any of its full-service offerings. Officials believed that this kind of service was necessary for the Wolf Point area. This indicated that increased community involvement was the only answer.

1967 Trinity Hospital Ambulance Service Disputed

In 1967, the cost of ambulance service was the next up for dispute; so, a committee was put together to save this service for Trinity Hospital. They felt that an ambulance service was a very important item in the emergency system. The hospital and ambulance system have to work hand-in-hand to provide this service.

1981 Addition to Trinity Hospital for Lab, EMS, ER

A 6,000-square foot addition was made at the northwest corner of Trinity Hospital. A new laboratory, twice the size of the existing one was added and a new emergency room adjoined with two examining rooms. A two-stall ambulance garage was also added so that both vehicles could be housed at the hospital. Other features added were offices for two physicians, renovation of the existing emergency room (creating a recovery room adjacent to surgery), and connection to the hospital so that people could go directly from clinic to hospital.

Present Day NEMHS

In 1996, Northeast Montana Health service was established and the combining of two facilities occurred. Wolf Point and Poplar became one unit of healthcare to provide distinct goals of healthcare and service to the communities. Goal 1: Decrease delays to clinic services to improve access to healthcare. Goal 2: Provide sufficient healthcare services with a view to prevent community members from having to travel long distances for healthcare. Goal 3: Provide education and resources for community members affected by alcohol and substance abuse. Goal 4: Increase awareness and education of services related to chronic disease How will NEMHS measure their success: Wolf Point and Poplar community members sport greater access, awareness, and satisfaction regarding services.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Another year in the books, and WOW what a ride 2020 has been. The first human case of COVID-19 was reported back in December 2019 in Wuhan, China. From there the World Health Organization declared the outbreak a Public Health Emergency of International Concern on January 30, 2020 and a pandemic on March 11, 2020.

As our previous Chairman, Shane Gibson said, health and wellness is no longer confined to the walls of our hospitals, clinics or Long-Term Care; and when our community/hospital had their first two cases of COVID-19 March 2020 it certainly proved that. We had to think out of the box and shift our paradigm. Patients stopped coming to the clinics and hospitals due to self and forced quarantines. Fear of exposure and the unknown were paralyzing. Our clinics set up visits by teleconference and telephone. IT helped patients set up ZOOM on their home computers and cell phones. Faith Lutheran Home was thrown into a battery of requirements and our family of residents were isolated from their loved ones; some passed on without family to be with them. Our community saw their loved ones being flown to larger hospitals and too many died.

The positive energy between our communities and facilities was never felt more as Fort Peck Tribes, Indian Health, Roosevelt County, Montana State Disaster, and NEMHS put aside differences and worked side by side helping each other with equipment, PPE, medicine, staff, testing and whatever needed to be done. *I am so proud of our communities*.

As with any disaster, special funds were made available to hospitals, clinics and Long-Term Care facilities across our nation. NEMHS's loss in revenue during this time was approximately \$2,000,000.00. Not only were there no hospital or clinic patients, but all outpatient services and

pharmacy fell to all-time lows. All projects and equipment purchases had to be put on hold. Whenever there's a storm, a rainbow usually follows and NEMHS was able to capitalize on funding from the CARES ACT and Payroll Protection Plan which kept our facilities and many others afloat during this time.

Through it all, we continued our mission of providing quality care, in whatever form it took. We continue to be passionate about caring for you in sickness and want to contribute to your wellness.

Nels and Amanda Christianson. She spent eight years in a one-room school and
went on to graduate from Wolf Point High School in 1943. Later that year she entered
nurse's training at Trinity Nursing College in Minot, North Dakota. Jean graduated
with her RN degree in late December 1946, three days before she married
Ted Schwinden in Butte, Montanal Jean was an Army Cadet Nurse but the war
ended before being called to active duty.



Jean worked in the Butte hospital until she and Ted moved to Missoula in 1947. She also worked at a Missoula hospital until she gave birth to her first son, Michael, in June 1948, followed by her daughter, Chrys, in September 1949.

In 1950, the Schwindens moved to Minneapolis where Ted went to graduate school while Jean cared for her son and daughter in a 20' x 24' home. The family spent summers in the Wolf Point area, and in 1954 moved back to the family farm, where her second son, Dore, was born in 1956.

The Schwinden family's gift to Northeast Montana Health Services is in honor of Jean Schwinden and will help provide much needed services for the women in a community which was so dear to Jean's heart.

FUNCTIONAL EXPENSES




CEO REPORT

Phew!!!! What a ride FY20 was! The first half of FY20 started out like any other year. We were on track with our budget and things were moving along at a predictable pace. But, by December 2019 we were hearing snippets of Wuhan China, and some human disease called COVID-19; and who in the world was this Dr. Fauci that spoke of pandemics and quarantines, scaring everyone? Little did we know that in three short months healthcare would be rocked and tested like at no other time. On March 11, 2020, a pandemic was declared by the World Health Organization due to COVID-19.

NEMHS did what every other facility was doing...activating their Emergency Operation Plan, shutting down their services, putting up barriers, going to endless webinars listening to people who did not understand this any better than we did. Meetings were endless. We quickly found ourselves in a supply crisis. You could not steal a mask because nobody had one. Our clinics and hospital were effectively shut down as there were literally no patients. Because we had no patients our statistics dropped to an all-time low as did our financials. By the end of FY 20 NEMHS experienced an approximate 2-million-dollar loss that could be directly attributable to COVID. Through the CARES ACT, the Payroll Protection Plan, and many other grants, NEMHS was able to keep ahead.

But you know who didn't win....every Long-Term Care Facility in this country. Yes, they received some money but they paid dearly. Nursing Homes saw our mothers, fathers, grandmas, grandpas, aunts, uncles, friends and loved one's battle this by themselves in isolation, cut off from everyone they held dear. They lived alone. They died alone. No one, family member or resident can make that kind of hurt go away. Thank God for FLH staff! Without them, our residents would have had no one. That is not how your "golden" years are supposed to be.

I could definitely go on, but we all know how the chapters played out and the story isn't finished yet. So it is that we need also to focus on the great accomplishments we did see. Through this all, we were able to recruit a new Physician, Dr. Steven Murrell, a Family Nurse Practitioner, Kelsey Haugo and Tom Schultz, CRNA.

Whenever there's a storm, a rainbow usually follows. Many other services or programs that were put on hold will be brought to fruition as soon as we get back to whatever our new normal will be. But hey...Life's a dance we'll learn as we go.
